STEWARDSHIP



DEAR FRIENDS,

PRESIDING BISHOP MICHAEL CURRY often describes us as "The Episcopal branch of the Jesus movement."

As we begin to talk about stewardship of our parish and wider community, we want to pose these questions: What does that mean for us? What is God calling us to do as followers of Jesus?

As Episcopalians, we love our worship. Our liturgies inspire us. The Eucharist is at the center of our lives. We believe the Bible is the word of God and we are people of the Word.

As part of the Jesus movement, we follow the One who loves us so much that he gave his life so that we might understand God's never-ending love for all of creation.

And here's the hard part: As followers of Jesus, we are called to give all of ourselves to God's work in the world. In the sixth chapter of Matthew's Gospel, Jesus, after teaching us how to pray, talks to us about money, our needs and our hope. He reminds us that we cannot have two masters. We cannot love God and money.

Jesus then says, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat or drink; or about your body, what you will wear. Is not life more than food, and the body more than clothes? Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they? Can any one of you by worrying add a single hour to your life?"

He finishes by calling each of us with these words, "But seek first God's kingdom and God's righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

How would our church —how would we — be transformed if each of us remembered these words of Jesus? We are indeed called to set new priorities.

Establishing new priorities for ourselves and for our church means transforming how we think about

generosity. That transformation will call upon us to look for generosity in every aspect of our work and in every aspect of our lives. Remember the tenth chapter of Mark's Gospel: "Jesus, looking at the man, loved him and said, 'You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me."

Jesus calls us to take the long view. Again he challenges us to give all of ourselves to God's righteousness and trust in God's care.

What a challenge! What transformation!

We hope you'll join us as we work together to transform generosity in our church, our community and our lives. In the following pages, you will read about God's accomplishments here at Redeemer through His various ministries.









Left: This chart represents January through August **actual** data and September through December **forecasted** data.

WORSHIP



AT REDEEMER WE proclaim and hear the Word of God through prayers, Eucharist, and music as we recall that it was the prayer of Jesus "that they may be one." Our collective time together in worship encourages and equips us for ministry and encourages our ties to God and to each other.

The members of the altar and flower guilds express their love and spiritual commitment in their thoughtful service preparation with attention to detail. Lectors, acolytes, ushers, and presenters thoughtfully facilitate our worship.

Our ties with each other are reflected in our services of new life in baptism, confirmation, marriage, funeral, and memorial services, in which we share and support one another. So we work through our worship life together to know and love one another and pass to each other the knowledge and love of God, and of his son, Jesus Christ, which is the foundation of the church from generation to generation.

On Sunday mornings Redeemer provides a variety of services that honor several preferences: quiet, contemplative services, family-friendly contemporary worship, and traditional liturgy and music. Special services are held throughout the church year to observe Holy Days. Baptism is held five times per year. In 2018, Redeemer's average Sunday attendance was 223, up from 174 the previous year.

Specific goals include:

Expanding youth ministry service roles during worship;

Providing lay-led small group worship offerings;

Exploring alternative Episcopal liturgies;

Supporting and expanding children's choirs;

Educating parishioners in the roles of the various worship sub-committees listed at right;

We will continue to welcome families and individuals of all generations, as we seek the truth of God's love for us, and better our understanding of God's plan for our lives together.

CHRISTIAN FORMATION



THE MISSION OF CHRISTIAN Spiritual Formation at Redeemer is to provide opportunities for all ages to explore their faith, feel the love of Christ, and come into a closer relationship with God. Led by Tricia Raybould since 2017, this commission supports the following subcommittees: Nursery, Children's (Pre-K—Grade 5) Sunday School; Youth (Grades 6-12) Sunday School; Adult Spiritual Formation, and ReACh.

Many exciting changes have occurred in the past year. Helen Pelkey was hired as Director of Children and Youth. Since beginning in April, she has started Youth Group, redecorated the youth Sunday School classrooms, and developed a new Sunday School curriculum.

The J2A rummage sale in February brought in more than \$18,000 to help fund their pilgrimage to Romania in June. They completed mission work to benefit the local Romany people and help a local church. They also visited several worship spaces, some of which have been in use for hundreds of years.

In the education domain, our Sunday School classes completed a year-long study of the Bible. During Lent, many adults attended presentations and discussions on grief. Adult Formation welcomed guest speakers from other faiths and looked at the lives of extraordinary Christians. Weekday Bible studies for men and women continue to grow.

With more than 70 persons registered, the second annual Parish Family Retreat, Pause, was held September 6-7 at Chanco on the James. Several youth worked with Impact Richmond and others volunteered at Shalom Farms this summer. Our first celebration of St. Nicholas Day was a success in December of 2018. Children heard the story of St. Nicholas, made crafts, and ate traditional treats.

Goals: To incorporate more mission work into the youth and adult programs. Currently, we participate in Impact Richmond and with Shalom Farms.

To have a stable base of volunteers available for the children and youth programs.



have spent the last five-and-a-half years working closely with Redeemer's programs for children and youth. I started as a J2A mentor in 2015. My time with those youth was extraordinary. When asked, I was unsure if I could be a strong mentor because I still had questions about my own faith and was still looking for my call.

I learned that being a good mentor doesn't mean I have all the answers. It means that I am willing to walk beside these youth as they try to figure out what questions they have and how to ask them. Watching "my kids" as they were confirmed at the conclusion of our time together was very emotional. I am so proud of the adults they have become.

Realizing that our children and youth needed an advocate, I became a Vestry member while still a J2A mentor. Being on Vestry representing Christian Spiritual Formation has been challenging, eye-opening, and extremely rewarding.

As I leave the Vestry this year, I am grateful for the time I have had in these positions working with our children and youth. While working with other parents in the church, I have had an opportunity to continue my faith journey with others who are at different places than mine, some just beginning and some much farther along. Seeing the excitement and energy of our children and youth has been rejuvenating, and I am so thankful that I accepted the call to be a J2A mentor.

In order to continue to expand its capacity, the Commission has focused on increasing the number of volunteers and providing training for them.

PARISH LIFE



THROUGH THE DEDICATION of many parishioners, the Parish Life commission has proudly hosted a number of adult and family-friendly events helping the parish family forge new friendships and renew old acquaintances to strengthen the ties of good will and harmony that is the center of the Redeemer church family. Led by Beth McGurl, the committee has been entrusted with the development of the church's social calendar. With that in mind, we've hosted a few different events that were inspired by new hosts (Twelfth Night, Field & Stream Men's dinner) and provided new opportunities to experience gatherings with a twist!

Those events which were successful in the past were repeated, and as a result, the combination of the new and the old has nurtured a steady increase in participation from the youngest to the oldest, singles to families, old and new parishioners. The parish guide includes a full list of prospects for the fall of 2019 through the spring of 2020.

To date, we have hosted several events: Twelfth Night/ Three Kings party on January 5 was attended by 170 diners. Later in the same month, the men stepped up to the plate with a new idea – Field & Stream Men's dinner at which the attendees prepared and served fish and game of many varieties. The men's Pancake Supper held on March 5 served pancakes and fixings for 138 adults and children. The second annual Celtic Feast on March 17 included a wonderful supper and Irish dancing presented by the Baffa Academy. The parish hall was bustling with 157 in attendance. Parish Life also coordinated the Lenten suppers at which the attendance averaged 55. We hosted our Rally Day Picnic and carnival on Friday, September 13 to celebrate the beginning of our new church school year.

Receptions are another facet of Parish Life. Holy week concluded with a celebration brunch of various sweets for approximately 170. In addition, the committee has assisted with a number of receptions after funerals and memorial services. Critical to the success of all parish life events are the folks who wholeheartedly assist with set-up, breakdown, food preparation, etc. We also enjoy the assistance of many other ministries such as Flower Guild, Hospitality & Evangelism, ECW, and worship.

Our goals include the following:

Involving a larger number of young parishioners in the planning and execution of fellowship activities;

Developing a stronger social media presence;

Revisit the Parish Life survey in January;

Developing ideas for new events, recruit volunteers, and expand the social calendar.

PASTORAL CARE



Pastoral Care is what our faith is built upon, helping those in times of need. At times, parishioners experience medical and family situations that deem them unable to cope in the short term. Pastoral Care offers resources to help facilitate those needs.

THIS MINISTRY PROVIDES direct organizational support through Eucharistic and personal visits, transportation and healing prayers to those in times of need. Talented committee members, in addition, create Prayers Shawls to provide comfort to grieving and ailing members and/or their families. Spiritual support is provided through private, quiet prayer, as well as vigilance in listening for personal needs.

The sharing of the Holy Eucharist with those unable to attend Sunday services doubled the number of participants in 2019, as on any given weekend there can be as many as seven or eight Lay Eucharist Ministers sharing the Eucharist with many of the Redeemer family, whether in home or other residential facilities.

Prayer shawls continued to be knitted, blessed and distributed to provide the warmth and assurance to those individuals who were in need of a particular comfort during times of personal hardship or duress.

The Transportation Angels commission has been created to assist parish members with rides to and from medical appointments or other personal needs that individuals are not able to attend with this assistance.

Altar flowers have being delivered after most weekly services to those individuals that needed a bit of brightness added to their day.

A further development of the Caring and Concern initiative, which was instituted to communicate through phone conversations with Redeemer members to let them know that their church family is interested in what is going on with them personally, spiritually and emotionally.


Our goals include the following:

BUILDINGS & GROUNDS



DEAR REDEEMER PARISHIONERS,

First, I want to say "thank you" for your continued support. We have made a number of strides this year. One of those strides is the addition of Harry Armstrong as our Building and Grounds Manager. With this addition we are becoming more pro-active in maintaining the building and in identifying problems earlier.

We executed the major project of filling the potholes in the parking lot with a mix of cement and gravel. This was a stop-gap measure delaying a full replacement of the lot surface – a very large expense!

We completed our interior LED lighting and sensor switch project. We will make a pivot to the second phase which will include the outside lighting and additional indoor areas which are not used very often but should be upgraded.

We continue to focus on the building exterior with repair to siding, doors and windows. These surfaces of the church have continued to deteriorate over the years. We have repaired the sanctuary doors instead of the costly option of replacing them – the final result was very satisfying. Windows are on an ongoing schedule of repair or replacement. The rotted exterior office door is next on the list with a full replacement. That will be followed with the main entrance doors and any disintegrating siding.



We have scheduled the exterior to be painted on an ongoing basis. We want to continue to focus on the building and work all of the scheduled and unexpected repairs into our budget. We have also incurred large expenses replacing outdated fire extinguishers and faulty automatic fire suppression heads throughout the building.

Our major achievement this year was the replacement of the church roofing. We are very pleased to have been able to do this with our yearly budget and a very generous designated fund gift.

Our plan this year is to slowly repair or replace all the windows in the building. We have also done many small repair jobs this year, and hopefully everyone realizes that the building is on track to where we want it to be.

Now for our wish list to keep the church liveable and operational. Our list of major needs starts with:

- 1. Air-conditioning/heating units: we had hoped to replace one per year, but the costs associated with keeping these very old units operating has impacted the budget. If we get closer to the end of the year, without any more major costs, we may be able to designate approx.. \$7,000 to replace one of the oldest units.
- 2. Painting on an ongoing basis the entire building needs it but our budget necessitates this being done in increments.
- 3. Parking lot: as noted previously.
- 4. New locking system for the church: We are looking at a keyless system as we need to make Redeemer more secure.
- 5. New sprinkler system: Needs to be installed.
- 6. Defibrillators in at least two well-traveled areas of the church. This is an often overlooked critical item.
- 7. Replacing the main entrance cupola flag and cupola roof

We have a budget for some of these items but the church is heavily used week in and week out - so in order to avoid a number of surprises, including our ancient A/C system. We will need to identify additional sources.
